

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Doesn't that perfectly relate to our guild; we work together to accomplish a common goal, we bring all the talents, experiences and gifts from our lives, and we weave them together with LOTS of thread-making, sharing, donating our quilts.

I want to take this opportunity to introduce myself to you. I was one of the founding members of this guild. My mother-in-law and sister-in-law were instrumental also in its founding and drug me along with them. I don't remember ever NOT sewing. Mν mother taught me when I was little. I, however, made clothing - not quilts. My mother-in-law taught quilting in her home and got me interested. I went to Paducah in 1986 and purchased, through her guidance, the fabric to make my first quilt. It was a very ambitious creation of my own design -12 blocks, on point, all appliquéd with a circular/wreath pattern, with lattice sashing with appliqué. Well, as she predicted, I never did make it. I did complete 4 of the blocks, and still have them in various stages of hand quilting.... Well, life took over, children, returning to college, and the building of a career bringing me to this point in my life where I am able to again come back to quilting. I love it!! (And, I don't make clothes anymore!) I am married, almost 29 years, have two grown children both exploring each of our nations' Washingtons, and I work full-time as a speech-language pathologist at a leading rehabilitation hospital.

I am looking forward to this year of being your voice, leading the group, and listening to all of you to continue to make this guild what you, the members, want it to be. I feel that I have tremendously large shoes to fill. A lot of wonderful leaders have gone before me setting a very high bar for me to reach up to. Please take time to talk to me and let me know what interests you and the direction you would like to see this guild go. Why do you come? What would get you involved, again or for the first time? Fabric Trade-In Sale

(or the "Clean Out Your Closet" Sale)

July 16-21

For every full pound of fabric you bring in, we will give you money off the purchase of more fabric (\$2.00 a pound for all cotton quilting fabrics or \$1.00 a pound for other fabrics). If you bring in 5 pounds of cotton quilting fabric, you will get \$10 off your fabric purchase. You can bring in any kind of **clean**, **new** fabric. (It has to be resaleable. It can't have pieces cut out of it.) You can use your "trade-in credit" on any non-sale regularly priced fabric on the bolt July 17-22 or save your credit and use it later. Individuals only. No groups or organizations.

Yard Sale - July 16-28

\$1.50 or \$2.50 a pound

We will sell the fabric which is traded-in for \$2.50 a pound for all cotton quilting fabric or \$1.50 a pound for all other fabrics. Whatever isn't sold, we give to charities.

Heartwarmers Update

Heartwarmers, our guild's community service project, continues to warm the hearts of local children who are chronically or critically ill. In September, 2006, we collected 28 quilts made by guild members, and in April, 2007, another 28 were turned in.


The Heartwarmers Project began in 1990 as part of the Linus project, which was originally intended to give quilts to children with HIV/AIDS. Since there weren't a large number of children with HIV/AIDS, the guild decided to make quilts for all critically and chronically ill children. Since then, our guild members have made and donated 2,550 quilts to our community. We have received many letters from families who have been grateful and amazed to receive such a gift.

The Heartwarmers Project asks guild members to make quilts for kids who are hospitalized with serious or chronic illnesses. These include baby quilts, quilts for school-age kids, and for teenagers; for both boys and girls. The fabrics should be washable and sturdy enough to stand up to a lot of wear and "love".

In addition to these quilts for kids, Heartwarmers projects include "Angel baby" quilts, a smaller size to be given to parents who lose a baby at birth. Often a stillborn baby is wrapped in the quilt and a picture is taken for the parents. Many parents are grateful for the memory of their precious little one who didn't survive, but is still a member of their family.

Guild members are asked to bring in quilts for Heart-warmers twice a year, usually in the spring and fall. Batting and labels are available to use in Heartwarmers quilts. Contact Carolyn Solomon for more information and to pick up batting or labels. Labels are also available at the guild library.




Janet Keesler has volunteered to chair NQD 2008 and will need lots of help, so let her know how you want to become involved.

Are you using our Library?? New books are being added frequently for your enjoyment. Here are books that will be added in July:

Creating Your Perfect Quilt Space by Lois L. Hallock

Say good-bye to that jumble of tools, muddle of magazines, and forest of fabric! Systemize your cluttered space with an expert's ideas on planning a functional and beautiful home quilting studio, a place where creativity wins over chaos. Create the quilt studio of your dreams with dozens of ideas for making your time more enjoyable and efficient.

• Blended Quilt Backgrounds by Jean Biddick

Quilt block patterns are transformed by Jean Biddick's new background piecing method. Watch blocks float, blend, and reshape themselves as the newly formed backgrounds become an integral part of the quilt's design.

French Braid Quilts by Jane Hardy Miller

Laced with a beautiful spectrum of colors, these eye-catching quilts feature one fresh technique with a variety of different looks. Create glowing effects by choosing a gradually shaded range of fabrics.

Mystery Quilts by Rita Fishel

Keep the projects fun, friendly, and finishable! It's no mystery why the author's quilt designs are so popular. She has created a series of charming quilts, easily adapted to mystery-quilt events for groups such as teachers, guilds, retreats, cruises, recreation centers, and senior centers.

Historical Penny Squares Embroidery Patterns by Willa Baranowski

For quilt historians, pattern collectors, and creative quilters, this book offers Penny Square quilts and embroidery patterns that tell stories or offer insight into the spirit of the quiltmaker.

Jack and Jill Quilts by Retta Warehime

Choose from a mountain of adorable quilts suitable for babies, toddlers, and children through their early teens. Sixteen quilts spotlight bright, cheerful colors in pieced and appliqued designs. Themes range from cowboys and cowgirls to flowers, candy, stars, bugs, and kites.

• Traditional Two Block Quilts by Sally Saulmon

By taking two or more traditional block patterns in the same quilt, the author takes us to a new level of design. Quilters will recognize many old 'friends' in these charming two-block quilts, such as Log Cabin, Sawtooth Star, Churn Dash, and Nine-Patch. There are also a few blocks that are a little unusual, and some three-block quilts were thrown into the mix just for fun.

Mary Schaffer American Quilt Maker by Gwen Marston

While we take for granted the passion for quiltmaking today, author Gwen Marston shows that it wasn't always so; indeed, one woman, Mary Schafer, was largely responsible for the restoration of interest in one of our greatest folk arts – long before the American bicentennial turned quilting into what seemed like an overnight sensation.

Stash Envy by Lisa Boyer

Funny woman Lisa Boyer is an expert quilter. And she's determined to enjoy making quilts. In fact, she will not – absolutely will not – let the risk of making a mistake, or a less than perfect quilt, keep her from relishing the task! A new book of quilting humor from the author of *That Dorky Homemade Look:* Quilting Lessons from a Parallel Universe.

Dimensional Quilts by Phyllis Dobbs

Take a traditional quilt block, and using this incredibly easy technique, create a dimensional quilt that really stands out in the crowd. Batting is used to increase the thickness of certain pieces and then author Phyllis Dobbs uses the special stitching instructions to secure the pieces for a dramatic dimensional effect.

• Color for the Terrified Quilter by Ionne McCauley and Sharon Pederson

This book was written for anyone who wants to know more about color. Find practical techniques and guidelines for making the perfect color choices for any quilt.


August 2007 – Wife Appreciation Day (Aug. 15)

Contrary Wife block - 6" finished block (6 1/2" unfinished)



To assemble: Complete the half square triangle units using the lavender and purple fabrics. Lay out the units and assemble as a nine-patch, as illustrated.

September 2007 – Father's Day in New Zealand (Sept. 2)

Contrary Husband block - 6" finished block (6 1/2" unfinished)

White (B) – Cut 4 - 2 3/8" squares, subcut these into 8 half square triangles (HST)

To assemble: Construct 8 HST units using the black and white HST. Lay out the HST units, black squares, and red center square and assemble as illustrated.


