### New Location for CCQG meetings: Cornerstone Church in Okemos



### Bus trip to Chicago Quilt Show

The International Quilt Festival of Houston is taking its show on the road to Chicago for the sixth year. Now the chance to attend an international show comes even closer to home. The CCOG is sponsoring a one-day bus trip to Rosemont, Illinois to see the International Quilt Festival-Chicago. The trip will be Saturday, April 18, 2009. There is room for 44 people on the bus. The cost will be \$52.00 per person for the transportation and admission to the show. Travel time to Chicago is estimated to be 4 hours. Departure from Lansing will be 6:30 a.m., from the Sears parking lot by the water tower. The approximate return time will be 10 - 11 pm. We will arrive there about the time the doors open for the show, so that everyone can have a full day to take in the quilts and vendors. Lunch and dinner will be on your own. The last couple of years people have been packing small coolers with their supper to avoid the cost of two meals at the convention center. No refunds will be made. If you cannot go, you will be responsible for finding your replacement. I will keep a list of alternate people. Payment of the \$52.00 should be made at the January & February guild meetings. I need payment a.s.a.p. to hold your spot on the list. All payments must be received by March 1.




### Easy & Elegant Quilts by Sara Nephew


Follow step-by-step instructions to make one of these 15 great quilts. Simplified directions help you cut 11 different shapes with your rotary cutter. Try a new one-patch pattern. Play up to 25 different design games and variations, learning how to pick fabrics for that special quilt.

### Dancing Quilts from Straight Pieces by Debbie Bowles

Two left feet? No problem with this smooth technique. Partner up odd-shaped pieces to create a rhythm all your own. The combination of two simple geometric shapes produces 'dancer' segments, which align beautifully into lively quilt designs. Fabric contrast, placement of the piece on the background, tilt, and placement of the segment in the quilt provide endless variations on more than 10 projects. Several projects contain additional photographs to illustrate these variations. Get carried away with Debbie's spirited approach to quiltmaking in projects such as Sash Dance, Rock & Roll, and Electric Slide. Creating the segments in dancing quilts is fun, inventive, and unpredictable, making each quilt uniquely yours. Decorative stitches and threads can be used to energize the small pieces in the quilts. The nature of the technique allows you to work on small segments at one time




Shadow Quilts by Patricia Magaret & Donna Slusser (donated by Florence Vogt)

Shadow quilts combine several visual layers of images to create a design. The smaller individual blocks compose one layer, while the shadow layer is a large motif that hovers in the background of the smaller blocks. Like an optical illusion, this shadow image is not immediately apparent but rewards the careful viewer gradually. Thus, for instance, an autumn leaves quilt consisting of 24 multicolored blocks of similar leaf designs camouflages a huge golden leaf residing behind them. The seemingly complex designs become quite attainable in the authors' capable hands; good directions and photographs ensure that anyone with a working knowledge of traditional piecing and a dose of patience can create these enchanting designs.

Measure the Possibilities with Omnigrid by Nancy Johnson-Srebro (donated by Nelda Orr)

Patterns and instructions for eleven splendid wall hangings, plus hundreds of quilt designs, make this a rich resource for both committed sewers and those looking to create occasional handcrafted gifts. Included are complete rotary cutting instructions and add-on seam allowances for twenty-three of the most unusual shapes in crafts and quiltmaking. Numerous illustrations show left- and right-handed quilters how to utilize the techniques.





### **Assistant Program Chair**

The assistant program chair assists the program chair with hostessing duties for visiting speakers, and plans and develops programs for the following year, when she will take over as chair. The assistant program chair is also responsible for planning the rules for the guild's annual challenge quilt.

### **Small Group Coordinator**

The small group coordinator collects names of quilters who wish to join a small group, based on different interests or home locations, and assists them in forming a group. She collects contact information and provides sign-up sheets for those interested in forming a group. She updates the guild's listing of small groups for publication in the newsletter. Small groups are essential to CCQG, in order to incorporate newer members into the guild and to foster continued learning experiences. CCQG does not require that all members of small groups also have CCQG membership.

### Membership Chair

The membership chair collects membership applications from the previous chair and keeps them, makes a computer record of all current members, makes a list of members who wish to receive newsletters via U.S. mail, and prepares mailing labels bi-monthly. She attends monthly meetings to record attendees as they enter (or gets a substitute). She also provides a sign-in sheet for guests and stick-on name tags for people who forget to bring theirs, keeps a supply of membership application forms at the check-in table, and accepts applications for membership and payments for memberships. Further, the membership chair keeps the membership list up to date, attends monthly CCQG Board meetings, and prepares new applications for membership for the March/April newsletter and to have at all meetings at the membership table.

### Newsletter Editor

The editor gathers submissions from guild members, suggests story ideas and seeks writers to produce them, and writes newsletter stories as needed. In addition, she edits stories, formats them using desktop publishing software, and proofreads. When the newsletter is completed, the editor submits it to the guild's webmaster and to the printers, and coordinates with those who will work on the distribution to ensure that it reaches members in a timely way. The editor also attends guild meetings and board meetings to gather news and information for the newsletter. The newsletter is published every other month.

### Newsletter Advertising Coordinator

The advertising coordinator corresponds with advertisers regarding deadlines, prices, and ad space requirements, keeps track of payments, and communicates with the editor regarding incoming ads.

### **Tiny Treats**

Usually, a small group takes on the task of providing block patterns for Tiny Treats. Tasks include deciding upon a theme for the year, deciding on appropriate blocks, and determining the fabric and color choices for each block. The group also provides a block image and cutting and assembly instructions for printing in the newsletter, working with the newsletter editor to meet the newsletter deadline and to accommodate the newsletter's technical and space requirements. Each pattern and set of instructions should be tested by someone other than the person who writes the instructions. Sample blocks should be made and displayed at the guild meetings for a month or two prior to the assigned month. At monthly guild meetings, group members staff the Tiny Treats table, set up the display board, and facilitate the drawing of the winner of the blocks.

### **Fat Chance**

Running the guild's "Fat Chance" program can be done by a group or an individual. The first duty is deciding upon a theme for the year and monthly choices. Other duties include: attending each guild meeting or finding a substitute to attend; setting up the Fat Chance table and attending to it during the meeting, including collecting fat quarters, having members sign slips for the drawing, enforcing the rules, and facilitating the drawing for the winner of the fat quarters. Further duties include: entering the winner's name and number of fat quarters won into the binder, and reporting this information in the newsletter.

### A Good Mystery Tour

I had a wonderful quilting excursion September 13 and 14 and want to share the fun with you. A bus full of fellow quiltaholics toured 12 shops in 2 days! It all started in Fremont. Early in the summer, I visited this nice little town to buy a bed, but when I saw a quilt shop I had to stop. The shop is called "Quilt Something" and is located right on Main Street. The owners, Debra and Susie were planning a "Mystery Quilt Shop Tour," the mystery being where we would be going. From shop to shop we did not know where we would go next! Probably the hardest part of the trip was getting to Fremont at 7 AM on a foggy morning. A side note, I did not drive from Lansing at that ungodly hour, but from my vacation home about 20 miles away. The trip started auspiciously in the dark and with heavy rain. Fortunately the bus was warm, breakfast was available and we quilters were ready to go. Day 1 took us to:

- Stop #1 Common Threads Quilt Shop, 109 N. Mill St., St Louis, MI
- Stop #2 Alma Sewing Center
- Stop #3 Elm Creek Ltd. Corner of M-115 and Surrey Rd. 2 miles west of Farwell
- Stop #4 AJ's Quiltery and Gifts 4532 Houghton Lk. Dr., Houghton Lake
- Stop #5 Crocker's Attic 3156 West M-55, West Branch
- Stop #6 Caroline's Sewing Room 3100 West M-55,. (Almost next door to Crocker's.)

From West Branch we traveled to Tawas where we spent the night at a Day's Inn and had a great dinner before collapsing into bed. Still raining!

Day 2 Still raining. We took a quick trip out to the Tawas Lighthouse then:

- Stop #7 The Cotton Patch 302 Newman St. East Tawas
- Stop #8 Ben Franklin Store, East Tawas
- Stop #9 Hollyhock Quilt Shoppe, 301 E. Main St., Harrisville
- Stop #10 Stitches for You, 422 S. Morenci, Mio
- Stop #11 The Ice House Quilt Shop, 509 Norway, Grayling
- Stop #12 Julie Ann's Quilting & More, Cadillac

After this last shop we had dinner and drove back to Fremont. Still raining, but our spirits were not dampened.

It was a wonderful trip, I didn't know one person at the beginning, but you know quilters, always friendly and chatty. All of the shops were interesting. Many were quite small, but managed to pack in exciting fabrics. All of the shop's owners were great, gave us discounts, snacks and little gifts! Caroline's offers retreats in their three Victorian bedrooms. The Cotton Patch is an extra nice shop, Elm Creek reminds me of Yoder's as it is part fabric and crafts and part garden center. At our last stop one quilter bought a panel with the following verse which sums up all our feelings.

### **Quilts and Poetry - A Collaboration**

### Visual Verse: Poetry Meets Fabric

In 2003, the Contemporary QuiltArt Association brought together forty poets and forty quilters for a unique undertaking. Gayle Bryan, former president of the association, explains the genesis of the project: "We'd been given a grant for a five year lecture series. The end of the five years was approaching and we decided that we wanted to do something special. The idea of working with artists in a different medium was appealing and we kept coming back to the idea of poets."

To facilitate cooperation between the two art forms, the QuiltArt Association set up a "mating service." It issued a call for poets in Seattle area universities, bookstores, and writing centers, then arranged an event at which poets and quilters were given ten minute interviews to decide if they wanted to exchange phone numbers. However, not all poets met through the service—some members, Bryan included, worked up the courage to contact poets themselves.

Once partners were selected, the pairs worked for one year investigating the intersections between textile art and poetry, ultimately creating artforms that fused the two genres. The finest of these collaborations eventually became the traveling exhibit Visual Verse: Collaborations in Poetry and Cloth.

"A lot of our quilters did the best work they've ever done while collaborating with the poets," Bryan said. "It's a huge obligation when someone else's work is involved with yours. Maybe only half the collaborations were selected for the show and, to be accepted, both the poem and the quilt had to be working."

### Sally Sellers & Nikki Giovanni: "I'm Not Sorry"

Like Gayle Bryan, Sally Sellers solicited her poet partner. When Sellers first learned of the Visual Verse project, she had been resistant to the idea of a collaboration, but that same day her daughter came home from school raving about their guest artist: Nikki Giovanni. "In six years of encountering guest artists, she had never been this enthused," Sellers said. "I submitted my idea to Ms. Giovanni, along with my portfolio. She responded that we should work together."

Sellers struggled with her quilt, "I'm Not Sorry," until she received Giovanni's poem, "Quilts," which begins:

Like a fading piece of cloth I am a failure

"I gathered up stained linens, mostly from second-hand stores," Sellers said. "Nikki's words reminded me that imperfect tablecloths were far more interesting than the pristine folds of fabric stashed away in the linen closet. My idea was to create a piece using stained areas, a piece most likely in white and beige and faded browns."

The real breakthrough came when, after reconsidering Giovanni's poem, she began highlighting the stains with gold beads. "In Nikki's poem," Sellers observes, "the stain was what was to be celebrated."

(for Sally Sellers)

Like a fading piece of cloth I am a failure

No longer do I cover tables filled with food and laughter My seams are frayed my hems falling my strength no longer able To hold the hot and cold

I wish for those first days
When just woven I could keep water
From seeping through
Repelled stains with the tightness of my weave
Dazzled the sunlight with my
Reflection

I grow old though pleased with my memories The tasks I can no longer complete Are balanced by the love of the tasks gone past

I offer no apology only this plea:



### President's block



One of our CCQG traditions is to honor our outgoing Board President with a shower of Ohio Star blocks to commemorate her service. It is time to begin planning for President Coreen Strzalka's blocks. Coreen has chosen red, black and white blocks in a 9" finished size. She would love any combination of these colors.

Here are the instructions:

Cut 4 squares  $4\frac{1}{4}$ " x  $4\frac{1}{4}$ ", and cut each square diagonally twice to make quarter square triangles (QST). (In the illustration below, there are 2 red squares cut into 8 red QST, 1 white square cut into 4 white QST, and 1 black square cut into 4 black QST. Adjust coloring as desired.)

Cut 4 squares  $3\frac{1}{2}$ " x  $3\frac{1}{2}$ " of background fabric (shown in white below.)

Cut 1 square 3½" x 3½" for the center.

Piece like this:

## **2008-2009 Tiny Treats**

Brought to you by Quilters Anonymous . . . celebrating some unique and interesting holidays. (We bet you've never heard of some of these!)

### February 2009 – Spunky Old Broads Month

Grandpa's Choice block - 6" finished block (6½" unfinished)



- Liaht:

Cut 6 squares, 2 3/8". Cut each square on the diagonal to yield 12 halfsquare triangles

- Dark "spunky" fabric:

Cut 1 square, 4 3/4"

Cut 2 squares, 2 3/8". Cut each square on the diagonal to yield 4 halfsquare triangles.

### To assemble:

- 1. Make 4 squares, using 1 light and 1 dark triangle
- 2. Sew 2 light triangles to dark sides of each square to make the four corner units of the block (see illustration).
- 3. Sew 2 corner units to opposite sides of the large square; then sew remaining corner units to the other two sides.

March 2009 - National Cleaning Week (March 22-28)

Here's a block called "Nonsense" to get you started on a week of quilting instead! Nonsense block - 6" finished block (6½" unfinished)





Cut 2 squares, 2 7/8". Cut each in half on the diagonal to make 4 halfsquare triangles.


Cut 1 square, 3 1/4". Cut twice on the diagonal to make 4 quarter-square triangles.

Cut 1 square, 2 ½".

- Green: Cut 4 rectangles, 2" x 3 1/4"
- Yellow: Cut 1 square, 3 1/4". Cut twice on the diagonal to make 4 quarter square triangles.



- 1. Sew a large pink triangle to the long edge of a green rectangle. Repeat to make four small corner units.
- 2. Sew a small pink triangle to either end of the green rectangle on two of these units, making 2 large corner units.
- 3. Assemble the center of the block by sewing two yellow triangles to opposite sides of the pink square. Add the other two yellow triangles to the other two sides.
- 4. Sew the small corner units to opposite sides of the center square. Then sew the 2 large corner units on opposite sides to finish the block.
