PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Quilt Science 101

I have been a member of Capitol City Quilt Guild for five years now. I wish I had known about the quilt guild when I first graduated from college so I could have joined back then. I lost a lot of possible guild years! But during my short membership time, I have noticed a couple science terms that apply to quilters and I want to share them with you.

Quiltertia!

Have you ever heard of **QUILTertia?** It is the first cousin to the term inertia, *defined as the tendency of an object at rest to remain at rest* (an example would be your spouse laying on the couch all weekend) *or the tendency of an object once it starts moving to keep on moving*. Well quiltertia, of course, applies to quilters only. Mostly is it witnessed as a quilter sewing or designing and not being able to stop. It can affect all levels of expertise and ages of quilters any where, at any time. It is more often witnessed at quilt retreats where people stay up all night and can't stop sewing, no matter how tired they are. It doesn't happen at much at home because of the sense of responsibility quilters have; but when it does occur, ironing (unless it is to get that seam to lay perfectly flat), laundry, cleaning, mending, hungry family members, and hungry kitties are ignored. When quiltertia hits, nothing can stop it. Everything becomes a blur even the fabrics that are being sewn together. The design is the most important thing and you can't divert your attention away from it. And time is warped! Ten minutes easily turns into one hour which becomes 10 hours in no time flat!

Fabric Pheromones

Have you ever wondered why there are some fabrics that you can not resist? It is because all fabrics give off pheromones. It is simple: quilters are biologically attracted to the fabric because of the pheromones being emitted by the fabric. Recent studies have found that different colors of fabric emit different pheromones. That is why you are attracted to certain colors because of the biological pull to the color's pheromone. As you age, your biological attraction to different pheromones changes, so your color preferences may change over time. I have noticed that I changed from a blue attraction to an orange attraction. (This is very common; it is called the "complement pheromone syndrome.") Now, you can logically explain your last large fabric purchase to your husband. It was biological.

Quiltensation

Quiltensation is very similar to condensation, defined as a gas turning magically into a liquid (an example of condensation is your grandpappy's old still that he used to distill alcohol.) Quiltensation is when fabric, thread, and batting are combined to turn into something magical – a quilt. And of course, the final product is worth much more than the individual parts that it is made of!

I want to thank all of you for letting me be your president the last year. I had a good time and I hope you all enjoyed the guild too. Although I will miss being president, I look forward to passing the gavel to Dan Burke. He will be a great leader for us in the coming year!

Quilt Artist Barbara Olson an award-winning quilter who has appeared in publications and exhibits around the world.




Cosmic Spirals

Saturday, May 23rd





Lenore's stunning style of art incorporated into quilts will make you stop and linger. A fellow Michigander, Lenore work has been displayed in Ann Arbor, San Diago, and France. Her workshops will inspire you to push beyond the traditional idea of a quilt and explore just what you can do with fabric.

A demonstration of Lenore's fusing technique will be shown through lecture slides and demonstration She will demonstrate how to create a small fused project working from a photo transferred to freezer paper and then muslin. Her fusing technique using Misty FuseTM will be shown along with her fabric painting on the finished design which adds depth and detail to the piece. She then finishes the piece with batting and backing and free-motion sewing changing threads constantly to add even more depth to the finished piece.









The Kindness of Quilters, and, a Mystery Solved

Quilters are perhaps some of the most giving, generous souls around. Whenever and wherever people are sick or in need, you will almost always find some quilters who are willing to pitch in and construct a soft, warm, and comforting quilt to wrap around a person in need of some love.

Members of the Capitol City Quilt Guild have demonstrated this to be true, over and over, whether it be through our contributions to Heartwarmers, a welcome home gift for a new Habitat home owner, quilts for foster children and the homeless, or exhibits to create beauty for hospice patients. And, in 2007, 2008, and 2009, breast cancer survivors have been the beneficiaries of several beautiful, warm reminders of hope and faith - quilts made by local quilters participating in Quilt Pink, a project of American Patchwork and Quilting magazine and supported by quilt shops and quilters across the United States. At least one quilt has been given to a breast cancer survivor at each of the last three Komen Greater Lansing Race for the Cure events, held in late April in downtown Lansing.

In 2009, two quilts were presented at the Race for the Cure. One was made by a local small group, Scrappy Women at Piece, headed up by Judith Green. I was surprised and delighted to be handed this beautiful completed quilt at a guild meeting a few months ago, to be given at this year's Komen race. Then, through a wonderfully surprising turn of events, a second quilt arrived. And therein lies the mystery.

The "Komen mystery quilt" arrived at the local Komen office where I work, a package sent from Komen headquarters in Dallas. It had no label, and no indication of its origin. We immediately decided that this unexpected gift should be given to a breast cancer survivor at our upcoming Race for the Cure. As a quilter, I thought - who was the maker of this quilt? It seemed wrong to me that the quiltmaker go unacknowledged. And I knew from experience that the recipient of this quilt would want to say thank you, and that the maker would enjoy knowing where her beautiful gift had ended up.

Quilt Pink events were last held in October 2007, during National Breast Cancer Awareness Month. Quilt shops hosted events or challenged their patrons to make blocks for quilts. Members of CCQG participated through the support of Everlasting Stitches Quilt Shop in Holt, where owner Pam Henrys donated block kits and other support. At that time, my small group, Quilters Anonymous, volunteered to put blocks together into completed tops. While our local Quilt Pink quilts were given to breast cancer survivors here in Lansing, many shops and events around the country sent completed quilts in to American Patchwork and Quilting magazine, who sponsored an Ebay auction to raise funds to support the national breast cancer research efforts of Susan G. Komen for the Cure. There was such an overwhelming response that not all the quilts could be auctioned, and the remainder were sent to Komen headquarters in Dallas. So I was pretty sure that our "mystery quilt" was one of the Quilt Pink quilts. I contacted Komen headquarters and American Patchwork and Quilting magazine in hopes of locating the quiltmaker. Neither had enough information to identify our quilt.

Then, as I was browsing through old quilting magazines one evening, I came upon the special edition of American Patchwork and Quilting entitled "Quilt Pink – Helping Fight Breast Cancer One Stitch at a Time", containing stories of Quilt Pink events in 2007. Literally thousands of quilts were made, and only a small handful were featured in the magazine. But, there on page 25, was our mystery quilt!! It was pictured in a story about the Calico Gals quilt shop in Fayetteville, New York, where shop owner Janet Lutz had devised an idea to showcase locally-made Quilt Pink quilts in a special display at a Fayetteville furniture store. The store allowed the local quilt guild and other participating shops to display the pink quilts throughout their large showroom as a way to raise awareness and funds for breast cancer research.

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It was a delight to contact Janet, and to figure out, with some help from APQ, which of quilts made at the Calico Gals shop was the one we had here in Lansing, and the identity of the maker. Janet then put me in touch with the maker, Pat Messina, who was also delighted to hear where her quilt would go. She graciously made a label for her quilt and mailed it to me. I attached it to the quilt so that the recipient will be able to acknowledge her generosity.

Mystery solved, and connections made, in yet another example of the generous spirit of quiltmakers everywhere!

If you are interested in making a quilt to benefit local breast cancer survivors, or if you would like more information about Susan G. Komen for the Cure, please contact me. I have "stash" of pink fabrics, and even a few orphan blocks, to get you started on the 2010 Race for the Cure quilt!



June 2009 – National Sun Safety Month Summer Solstice block – 6" finished block (6½" unfinished)



Materials to make 2 blocks:

Golden yellow: A - one 3 7/8" square, cut in half diagonally

B - four 2" x 31/2" rectangles

C - two 2 3/8" squares, cut in half diagonally

D - two 2" squares

Medium blue: E - one 3 7/8" square, cut in half diagonally

F - four 2" x 3 1/2" rectangles

G - two 2 3/8" squares, cut in half diagonally

H - two 2" squares

To assemble:

1. Sew A & E as half square triangle unit

2. Sew C & G as half square triangle unit


3. Assemble as a nine-patch (see diagram):

Row 1: HST unit C & G, yellow B rectangle, blue H square

Row 2: blue F rectangle, large HST unit A & E, yellow B rectangle

Row 3: yellow D square, blue F rectangle, HST unit C & G

July 2009 - National Ice Cream Day (July 19) Bear Tracks block - 6" finished block (6½" unfinished)



Materials:

Plaid: Three 21/2 " squares,

Two 2 7/8" squares, cut in half diagonally

Cream: Two 21/2" squares

Two 2 7/8" squares, cut in half diagonally

To assemble:

1. Using the 8 triangles, make 4 plaid & cream Half Square Triangle units.

2. Assemble as a nine-patch (see diagram):

Row 1: Cream square, plaid square, HST unit Row 2: Plaid square, plaid square, HST unit

Row 3: HST unit, HST unit, cream square

Will there be a Combined Quilt Show with Lansing Area Patchers?


Some time last year, I was approached by a LAP member about having a joint quilt show between Lansing Area Patchers (LAP) and Capitol City. I brought this up to the Capitol City quilt board for discussion. Some main points that were discussed were the ability to have a larger, more consistent show every year; how to divide the money between the two groups; and the amount of work for our guild members every year.
