Festival of Trees

The CCQG board has made the decision to participate in the 2010 Tri-County Area **Festival of Trees**, which will be held at the Lansing Center in Downtown Lansing, December 3rd, 4th and 5th, 2010. This annual event is a fundraiser for non-profit groups and features items donated by companies who choose which charity their proceeds will go to and items provided by the non-profits themselves. All items will be up for raffle, with raffle tickets sold at the show. Attendees place their tickets in a box in front of the item they wish to win.

Items donated for raffle are themed, full-size and table-top trees (often with gift cards, lottery tickets and other goodies attached!), wreaths, centerpieces, gingerbread houses, and other holiday items, all beautifully decorated in the spirit of the season. (As of Oct.18, 132 trees and multiple wreaths have been donated.)

Area bakeries will participate in a Gingerbread House competition, again with the houses being raffled off. One decorated tree and a Christmas shopping spree will be raffled off as a door prize—your ticket stub is your entry.

Last year the event drew nearly 23,000 attendees and netted over \$380,000, which was divided between the non-profit groups. As a participant, our guild is asked to sell between 100—125 admission tickets at a price of 2 for \$20; the guild keeps \$10 of that with \$10 going to the show. Once the costs of the show are covered, the remainder is divided up equally among the non-profit groups. The tickets are good for all 3 days and are transferable. See Sharon Neuner to get tickets to sell. Friday is Senior Day with live entertainment, Saturday is kid's day, with "Make & Take projects, Disney characters, and of course, Santa Claus; Sunday is the large raffle.

The guild will donate a quilt and a table runner and individual guild members or small groups may also donate items, which should be submitted by Nov.15. Items that can be donated are trees, wreaths, wall hangings, table runners, quilts, etc.

There will also be a "Crafters Lane" for handpicked crafters at a charge of \$25 a space. Crafters must provide (or rent for \$50) a 10' x 10' pop-up tent for their display. Crafters may keep all proceeds of their sales. If interested in participating in the Crafters Lane, contact Rob Haney at (517) 410-8376.

DECEMBER FELLOWSHIP BLOCK Christmas Jewel Box 12" finished / 12 ½" raw



Use Deep Red or Christmas fabrics for (A); Forest Green for (B)

- 1) Cut 4, 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ inch squares in each (A) and (B)
- 2) Join in squares to make 2 4-patch squares
- Make 2 half square triangles to a 6 ¹/₂ inch finished size – use (A) and (B)
- 4) Sew together 4 blocks as shown.



Use White for (A); Dark Blue for (B); Light Blue for (C)

Cut 4, 4 ½ inch (C) squares
Make 4 half square triangles to a 4 ½ inch finished size – use (A) and (B)
Arrange all squares & sew together as shown

Although the placement of squares is very similar to the October Monkey Wrench; the color placement creates an entirely different look.

Teachers and Class Descriptions

Barb Vlack is known as an EQ7 software expert and an author for Electric Quilt Company. She is internationally known for her Electric Quilt work and has written several books to complement the EQ manuals. She has taught classes at the highly recognized quilt shows in Houston, TX, Paducah, KY and Lancaster, PA.

Electric Quilt for Beginner (no class fee) Saturday, May 21, 2011

In this EQ7 introduction, learn to use the block library, set blocks into quilt layouts, add borders, color blocks on the quilt, and print patterns. This is a computer hands-on class. Students must be familiar with using their own laptops, as here will be no instruction or tech support for the use of laptops. Class is open to those who have little or no experience with EQ7 or would like to learn about the program before purchasing it.

Supplies: Laptop, extension cord, note taking materials, and EQ7. If you have the program, load it onto your laptop. If you don't have it, please e-mail Barb at barb@barbvlack.com to let her know that you will need to use a limited-use classroom version. Please arrive at class one hour early in order to get the program loaded on your laptop.

Karen Turckes is an award winning fiber artist. She is a hand dyer, quilter, certified sewing teacher and pattern designer. As the owner of Windberry Studio, she sells hand dyed fabric, art cloth and her new Landscape pattern. Along with dying fabric, she uses shibbori, silk screening, discharging and stamping techniques. Karen has also developed many free motion quilting classes. Visit her gallery at www.windberrystudio.com.

Design Your Own Fat Quarter Landscape—Class Fee \$25 Saturday, May 21, 9 am to 4 pm

Create the place of your dreams using Karen's new landscape pattern. Begin with a three piece background. From there, add sand dunes, bays, lighthouses, trees, animals, etc. Over 70 pattern elements to select from, providing endless possibilities. Create your own mood, or even your own season. Learn designing, cutting and fusing techniques as well as how to quilt the landscape. Karen will have her hand dyed fabrics available for purchase at class.

Class fee: \$25 for the "Design Your Own Fat Quarter Landscape" pattern. (To have it mailed to you before class, the cost is \$28.50. Contact Karen at Karen@windberrystudio.com)

Supplies: Fabric – it will depend on what you choose to make. Tightly woven fabrics are excellent for this raw-edge technique because they are less likely to fray. Batiks and hand dyes are great!

•You need a total of 3 fat quarters, 1 each for sky, water and land background pieces (avoid solid colors.)

•Bring additional fat quarters in a variety of greens for trees and grasses; browns and grays for bark and rocks; red, white and black for lighthouses. Choose a variety of fabrics that have contrast in order to show up against each other, to create your color scheme.

•Lite Steam-a-Seam (by The Warm Co.) which is a paperbacked fusible web. If it is 12" wide, you need 3 - 4 yards. If it is 24" wide, you need 2 - 3 yards. Karen will have 24" wide Lite Steam-a-Seam available for purchase in class.

•Foundation: 18 inches by 22 inches light-weight muslin, cut on the straight of grain.

- •Batting: 20 inches by 24 inches, or if with border, 27 inches by 31 inches
- •Backing: 20 inches by 24 inches, or if with border, 27 inches by 31 inches
- •Binding: 1/4 yard or 1/2 yard if you add a 3 ¹/₄" border
- •Teflon pressing sheet
- •Extra fine tip sharpie marker
- •Fabric markers (optional)
- Fabric adhesive spray
- Exacto knife



Vernita Dailey is a highly regarded and knowledgeable quilter. She is known as a creative quilter with impeccable taste for color and design. Her vast experience includes teaching several classes for the "Strip Club" and the "Mary Jane" blocks. She is a great teacher and will have a class that you will not want to miss.

Curvaceous Delusion (class fee \$25)

Sunday, May 22, 9:00 am to 4:00 pm

Creating this 21" round Halloween Table Topper will help you master paper-piecing and curves all in one project. You will learn to create an original quilt block design using a new and innovative technique. Vernita is out to banish all "spooky" myths regarding the difficulty of these two "scary" precision piecing techniques. Unleash your imagination to the endless possibilities of this block from table toppers, runners to full size quilts. Quilters of all levels are welcome to join the "good witch" of paper piecing.

Kit fee is \$25 and includes the pattern and all the fabric (backing and binding too) to make the table topper, specialty sewing machine needle, high quality thread, flower pins, Mylar, and surprises!

Supply list: Sewing machine, Add ¹/4" ruler, small rotary mat to be placed next to your machine, rotary cutter, shears, and other basic sewing supplies.
