





Half-Square Triangle Instructions

1) Cut squares from the two chosen fabrics that are 7/8" larger than the finished size of the units.

2) Place right sides together with the lighter square on top. Draw a diagonal line on the lighter fabric from one corner to the opposite corner. Stitch 1/4" on each side of the marked line.

3) Cut the triangles apart on the center line and press open. Trim. There will be 2 half square triangles that should measure finished size plus 1/2".

Why join a CCQG small group? by Deb Martens

Small groups within CCQG are numerous and active. Are you in a small group? If not, why not give it a try?

For me, and for many members of CCQG, being a part of a small group is a source of great joy. You will come together with other quilters, perhaps people you haven't even met before, and after a few months of joining together in quilting activities, you will become great friends. There is something about working on a group quilt, exchanging blocks or fabrics, going on shop hop trips or visiting a quilt show together, that brings out the commonality of our feelings about our passion for quilting. Along the way, we get to know each other as people with joys and heartbreaks, families and jobs, and all the many concerns of our daily lives.

I am part of three separate small groups, each with its own personality. One of the groups I belong to is geographical; we all live in and near our community. We share a connection of children who have been in school together, membership in local churches and organizations, and knowledge of our neighborhoods. As for quilting, we are a mostly work-on-our-own-projects kind of group, but sometimes come together to make a charity quilt or do a block exchange.

Another of my small groups really revolves around quilting: we started as a block exchange group, and now meet for monthly sewing days. We take field trips to shows and shops, and we often share a meal together and visit each others' homes. Our sewing days are something we all look forward to every month. We help each other with our separate projects, from an opinion on fabric choices to helping "unsew" the occasional oops! We have done several block exchanges, made charity quilts, done specific projects as a group (stack 'n whack, bargello, shadow quilts), taken on leadership roles in guild together, and just generally have bonded into a tight-knit group.


My third and newest group came together around the idea of making quilts to meet a specific design challenge. This is an adventurous group, full of positive and generous quilters. We are just getting started and it has been a really fun group so far! I look forward to the coming months and years, and getting to know these folks better. I am inspired and in awe of their collective imagination and energy!

Whatever your motivation or available free time, there is likely to be a small group for you! While many existing small groups are not open to new members due to space constraints, some are, and new groups are forming all the time. Check the guild's website for a list of small groups open to new members, or contact me or Helen Harrison, your small group coordinators, for help in forming your own small group. You will also find resources for small groups, such as ideas for block exchanges and other activities, on the website. Thank you to Rosemary Nester and Janet Scott for compiling many of these ideas.

Finally, our November guild meeting is traditionally a forum for small group sharing with the larger guild. Don't miss this program! You will be inspired to learn the many ways that small groups interact with each other. The groups will also present a "show and tell" of their projects! 



Christina DeArmond





Her need to produce projects fast and accurately evolved into a new machine technique she calls piec-liqué (pronounced like appliqué.) This method provides the speed and control to make curved piecing fun. Three dozen gorgeous block patterns have been designed or redesigned with simple curved elements. The author's original designs include beautiful flowers, like the simple daisy, charming blue bells, and the sophisticated black-eyed Susan. Quilt makers will also find excellent information on fabric selection and figuring yardages.





Crazy Shortcut Quilts




