Additional Information on Pat Speth's workshops in January:

On Friday, Jan. 18, Pat will present the workshop "Combination Units". You can choose from six quilts: Pinwheel or Labor Day Madness from her book Nickel Quilts, Sugar Bowl (from More Nickel Quilts), Minnesota Windmill (Amazing Nickel Quilts), Liberty Star (Nickel Quilts and Borders), or Labor Day Stars (an individual pattern).

On Saturday, Jan. 19, she will present the workshop **Pieced Borders the Nickel Quilt Way**: Jazz up your quilts by adding easy pieced borders. Learn unit construction methods for several basic border units (half square triangles, flying geese, hourglass units, picket fence and more) and how to fit any pieced border to your quilt top.

Time to start making items for the Silent Auction!

Donations are not limited to guilts. We can use guilted Items including wall hangings, table runners or toppers. pot holders, placemats, bibs, Christmas stockings, purses, or tote bags; embellished items like t-shirts, sweatshirts, or towels; sewn items like aprons, pillow cases, dolls, or pillows; or other handmade items such as baskets, jewelry or doilies. 





February TINY TREATS Be My Valentine 9" finished /91/2" unfinished







This month you have the opportunity to be creative and make most of the decisions. February's block requirement is a heart(s) made from red floral print fabric placed on a white or white on white background. The background square should measure 9 1/2" unfinished, 9" finished. Please cut the background larger until you are finished working on it. The fabric for the heart should have at least one large flower on it or many small flowers. Look for a pattern or draw your own pattern.

Designing your block: The heart can be by itself, or add other hearts, a stem/leaves to make it look like a flower, or any embellishment (lace, beads, etc). You choose: size, shape (symmetrical or asymmetrical), position of the heart on the background, pieced, or appliquéd (needle-turned, buttonhole stitched, fused & stitched, stitched by machine or by hand).

March TINY TREATS Spring Blooms 9" finished /91/2" unfinished



Cut:

- White 3½" squares
- 4 Floral Print 3½" squares
 - 1 Yellow 3½" squares

This is a basic 9 patch pieced block

Layout:

Row 1----Sew 1 white, 1 print, 1 white

Row 2----Sew 1 print, 1 yellow, 1 print

Row 3----Sew 1 white, 1 print, 1 white

Sew rows together.

This is easy, quick, and you can use up your scraps! Enjoy.
