Ogemaw County Quilt Trail

In 2001 Donna Sue Groves, in Adams County, Ohio painted a quilt block on her barn to honor her mother, a master quilter. From that humble beginning has grown a national movement of counties and communities developing their own trail of quilts on barns, houses and other buildings throughout America. More than 30 states now have Quilt Trails with over 3,000 registered quilt blocks. The movement shows no sign of stopping.

The West Branch Area Chamber of Commerce (WBACC), Ogemaw Genealogical and Historical Society (OG & HS) and the West Branch Creative Arts Association (WBCAA) is partnering up to start the Ogemaw County Quilt Trail. Our goal is to involve community groups, organizations, businesses and families in painting and installing quilt blocks in all of Ogemaw County. Through the efforts of the WBCAA, WBACC and OG & HS we are helping to preserve our heritage of old barns and outbuildings in Ogemaw County. Friends, neighbors and visitors to our area will explore the highways and back roads to see the Quilt Trail and to discover the beauty of Ogemaw County. Along the way they will eat, shop and spend time here. The Ogemaw Quilt Trail is a volunteer organization and could not exist without dedicated volunteers who design, draft, paint and champion the quilt blocks. We welcome volunteers at any level of commitment. No special skills are necessary. Our quilt blocks can be painted by volunteers from age 9 to 90! We welcome individuals, family groups, school groups, businesses, and organizations to join the fun!




Units


We had very good participation in May. Our first winner received 240 units, a good start on a quilt top! Here are the next two "Units." Keep making units using any light and any dark fabric. Taking home several hundred already assembled units is worth entering.

July Four-patch Unit

With right sides together, place a 5" light fabric square on a dark 5" square. Stitch a $\frac{1}{4}$ " seam on opposite sides of the square. Cut the unit in half so that each piece measures $2\frac{1}{2}$ " x 5". Press each unit open. With right sides of each piece together, align the seams so that the dark and light fabrics are opposite each other. Again, stitch $\frac{1}{4}$ " seam on opposite sides of the square. Cut the resulting unit in half so that each four-patch unit measures $4\frac{1}{2}$ " x $4\frac{1}{2}$ ". Make four more sets and bring all 10 to the July meeting.










August Hourglass Unit

Start with two 5" squares, one a light fabric, the other a dark. Draw a line diagonally on the light one, place them right sides together and sew a scant $\frac{1}{4}$ " on either side of the diagonal mark. Cut on the diagonal line, press open. Again draw a diagonal line in the opposite direction on one of the half-square triangles. With right sides together and the dark and light triangles opposite each other, stitch a scant $\frac{1}{4}$ " on either side of the line. Cut on the diagonal line to yield two hourglass units. Press open and square to $4\frac{1}{4}$ " X4 $\frac{1}{4}$ ". Repeat four more times and bring all 10 units to the August meeting.
