CHEMO QUILTS UPDATE

A dozen dedicated quilters plus a small group have kept our chemo quilt project going during 2021 despite all the challenges, with other folks donating supplies - many thanks to each of you! The patients at the Breslin Cancer Center (McLaren) are very grateful to receive our beautiful handiwork! Someone who is facing cancer with long hours of chemo treatments, and feeling alone and scared, can be wrapped in an unexpected hug that will warm the body and, many times, the heart too. Would you be interested in participating this year? Quilt top size can be from 48" x 60" up to 60" by 76" (no wider). Any pattern you like and any colors would be fine; panels work well too. Quilts are needed for both women and men. I will do the quilting for you. Fleece is used for the backing, and only needs to be 5-6" longer than the quilt top. This month I have a stash of it, so you can ask me if I already have a piece the right size/color for your guilt. Binding to match the guilt top is very helpful, and needs to be at least 2 1/2" wide because fleece is thick! If you don't have any coordinating fabric left though, I can try to find a solid fabric that will work, so don't let that stop you. If you have no fabric, kits of fabric left over from our garage sale will be given out soon along with simple patterns that can be made a little bigger - take one and try it. They're fun and easy! And you'll feel good about sharing your talents. Questions are welcome! - Elaine Hewitt

PRESIDENT'S BLOCKS for Cathy Skelton

Cathy has requested that these fabrics be used: Nature fabrics (plants, animals, geology, weather, astronomy, for examples) for the star, and medium to dark green for the background.

Instructions

Cut from background fabric:

4 - 4" squares

2 - 4 3/4" squares. Cut these squares twice diagonally to make 8 quarter square triangles.

Cut from star fabric:

1 - 4" square

2 - 4 3/4" squares. Cut these squares twice diagonally to make 8 quarter square triangles.

Assemble as an Ohio Star block, 11" unfinished, 10 $\frac{1}{2}$ " finished.
