
#### PROGRAMS for SUMMER 2022

#### JUNE

Friday, June 17: Class at Country Stitches: "It's a Wrap!" (a sashiko-embellished wrapping cloth)

The class has a morning session teaching Japanese hand stitching called sashiko (10AM-noon). In the afternoon session (1-3:30 PM) assembling by machine piecing a traditional Japanese wrapping cloth using the sashiko sample from the morning session.

I was introduced to quilting in about 2003, when a very good friend gave me a 'starter kit' of FQ, a combo pack of cutter, ruler & mat and the Yellow Brick Road pattern as an extremely generous Christmas gift. She had been quilting a couple of years...and it took me AT LEAST a couple of years before I decided to give it a go. Well, we know how that goes...here I am in 2022 with a number of quilts under my needle, including a fresh version of Yellow Brick Road without all the mistakes!

#### **UFO WOES—Tips from our Veep**

Been having a stand-off with my quilting journey as I foolishly swore that I would finish a UFO before starting something else. All that has done is bring me to a complete stand-still. So I have been re-reading a few magazine articles addressing UFO woes, and without actual plagiarism, here are some tips:

Gather up the entire UFO, and put it in a bag or project box. NOT a brown paper bag, that turns a perfectly good UFO into a PIG (project in grocery sack). If at all possible, write yourself a note about what stopped you from finishing in the first place. Did you cut something wrong & get completely frustrated? Were the pattern instructions really pretty poor? Do you just plain not like it? Give your future self some clues! Stumped? Give yourself permission to move on, and that means getting the thing out of your house. Should we plan a UFO swap?

Make yourself a list of the those UFO's that you think deserve the time and attention to finishing them. IF YOU DON'T LIKE IT YOU DON'T HAVE TO FINISH IT. Consider using the few blocks you do have made to make very simple projects, like a placemat or 10.

Grab one project...break down the remainder to finish it into small steps. Cross off a step from your notes each time you get one done...baby steps to success.

Consider a self-imposed deadline for ONE project.

Give yourself a reward for making progress on any of this. 15 minutes of sorting & purging is enough for 1 session...if you complete xx amount of sessions, win a prize! ( you get to pick the prize you give yourself!)
